2026 Financial Plan

West St. Paul Mayor and Council have once again delivered a financial plan that maintains one of the lowest mill rates in the capital region while continuing to invest heavily in infrastructure, recreation, and community safety.

"We as a council, along with our staff and management team, know that decisions made during budget deliberations are the most important we make all year and we look to keep residents foremost in our minds," said Mayor Peter Truijen.

"We feel that with this year's budget we've made investments into important infrastructure like roads, recreation, community safety, and by-law enforcement. We're delighted to be able to deliver another budget without an increase in taxes, keeping the same mill rate as last year."

There is no increase to the mill rate for 2026. Over this Council's term, the mill rate has steadily decreased—from 9.10 in 2022 to 6.296 in both 2025 and 2026.



During that same period, the RM has experienced strong, steady growth. Between 2025 and 2026, total assessment increased by 6.02 per cent, following the reassessment completed in 2025. This planned growth continues to strengthen the municipality's financial position and helps distribute costs across a broader tax base, allowing the RM to maintain affordability while still delivering meaningful improvements throughout the community.

Councillor Kleiber has consistently supported four years of 0% tax increases for residents, demonstrating a strong commitment to protecting taxpayers while ensuring the municipality continues to meet community needs.

Road renewal and maintenance remain a major focus again this year, with a budgeted investment of \$2,115,000. This follows the \$1,939,212 spent on road projects in 2025 and reflects Council's ongoing commitment to improving transportation routes and supporting

longterm infrastructure health. Roads included in the 2026 program are Addis Avenue, Caravelle Lane, Diane Drive, Holland Road, Jackman Road, Lister Rapids Drive, Miller Road, Mirabelle Road, River Elm Drive, Riverglen Crescent, Rossmore Avenue, St. Paul Boulevard, and Vandal Street.

"As a Councillor for the RM of West St. Paul over the past 12 years, it is very encouraging to see another financial plan that includes a 0% mill rate increase while still delivering meaningful investments in road upgrades and municipal projects" said Councillor Giorgio Busceti.

"I believe this council has also maintained a strong commitment to resident safety, demonstrated through the implementation of a Municipal Community Safety Officer program. In addition, there have been numerous improvements throughout the municipality, including pedestrian crossings with

flashing lights and traffic-calming measures such as speed control devices and speed bumps.”

Recreation and community amenities also see a significant investment of \$630,403 in this year’s plan. The Access Centre site will undergo major upgrades, a new park shelter and pond lighting will be added to the Meadowlands development, the path surrounding the pond in the Trails development will be upgraded to asphalt, among other projects.

These enhancements support the RM’s longterm vision of creating accessible, highquality recreation spaces for residents of all ages.

A key highlight of the 2026 financial plan is the introduction of the Community Safety Officer (CSO) Program, which strengthens the RM’s capacity to respond to community concerns and enhance public safety. New investments under this program include radios for By-law and CSO staff, body-worn and vehicle-mounted cameras, laser speed detectors, and portable weight scales. These initiatives form part of a broader \$23 million

plan that supports safety, infrastructure, and community wellbeing.

Councillor Mike Pagtakhan says he is thrilled about the Community Safety Officer (CSO) program. “Our CAO was instrumental in bringing this initiative to life. The new CSO’s will have the authority to enforce all RM by-laws, as well as monitor speeding on any street within the RM’s boundaries and to issue tickets as appropriate.”

West St. Paul continues to maintain strong reserve balances to support future priorities and ensure longterm financial stability. At the end of 2025, reserve balances totaled \$25,169,683. For 2026, \$12,341,098 in reserve spending is budgeted, including \$9,157,863 in carry forward projects and \$3,183,235 in new capital spending. A common benchmark in municipal finance is to maintain reserve balances equal to approximately one year of operating expenses to ensure readiness for emergencies or unforeseen events. For 2026, this target is \$11,099,624. Upon completion of the 2026 capital program, the RM is projected to meet this recommended one-year operating reserve target, ensuring the

municipality remains financially prepared for future needs and unexpected events.

“This budget reflects a credible and competitive financial plan that keeps West St. Paul among the most affordable municipalities in the province,” said Chief Financial Officer Yemi Olaleye. “We’re delivering real capital investment while preserving the reserve strength that protects taxpayers long-term.”

In 2025, the RM received \$4,746,161 in grants, which continue to play an important role in reducing the financial burden on local taxpayers. Major contributions included the Municipal Operating Grant of \$823,400, the Canada Community-Building Fund (Gas Tax) of \$387,057, the MMSM & WRARS Recycling Grant of \$247,681, the MWSB Water Distribution WSP (11) grant of \$127,934, and the MWSB Water Supply Reservoir Expansion WSP (13) grant of \$2,903,069.

Each member of Council contributed to shaping this year’s financial plan, bringing forward priorities from their wards and advocating for projects that support residents across the municipality. ●●●

New Multi-Family Development coming to Parkview Pointe Neighbourhood

The RM of West St. Paul and GS Homes are pleased to mark the official groundbreaking of a new multi-family housing development in the Parkview Pointe neighbourhood.

This project represents an important step in supporting continued growth in our community and expanding local housing options. Once complete, the development will include 96 units across eight two-story, 12-unit buildings. All units are planned to be

three-bedroom, offering a housing option suited to young families as well as seniors seeking additional living space without the maintenance of a larger home.

The development will include on-site tree planting and internal pedestrian sidewalks, which will connect to existing sidewalks on Parkview Pointe Drive and a future connection on Elm Drive. Building designs will vary and are intended to complement and seamlessly integrate with the existing character of homes in Parkview Pointe.

Members of Council and project partners were in attendance to celebrate the start of construction and recognize the collaboration that made this project possible.

The RM of West St. Paul looks forward to welcoming future residents to Parkview Pointe and to seeing this development take shape in the months ahead. ●●●



Accessibility Act all about removing barriers

The Accessibility for Manitobans Act came into law in 2013. The legislation is aimed at removing and preventing barriers for people with disabilities by creating accessibility standards for various sectors. It applies to government, businesses and non-profits. The RM of West St. Paul is continually working to improve accessibility and is in compliance with the standards established under the Act.

In this issue of West St. Paul Connections, we will take a look at the types of informational and communication barriers and possible solutions.

Barrier: Print that is too small to be read by a person with impaired vision.
Solution: Make everyday documents, such as signs and menus, easy to read by making sure the print is legible for most people.

Barrier: A PowerPoint or slide deck used in a presentation is not accessible to employees with low vision or who have hearing loss.
Solution: Develop a template for slide decks using large fonts, high contrast colours and clean layout. Provide a visual description of the slides when making a presentation.

Barrier: Videos to promote a program or service are not accessible to employees with low vision or who have hearing loss.
Solution: Include captions when producing videos. When this is not possible, provide a text transcription of the video.

Barrier: Brochures, guides and advertisements that are not clear or easily understood.
Solution: Use plain language in written materials. Use symbols and pictures to help get your message across. Use sans serif fonts and avoid italics.

Barrier: Complicated, busy or confusing signs.
Solution: Keep signs clean and clear. Make information available in another form, such as a chart or pictogram.

Barrier: Seating arrangements making it difficult for people who have hearing loss to fully participate in meetings.
Solution: Arrange seating at a round table to facilitate lip reading. Use assistive listening or amplification devices as appropriate.

Barrier: Marketing and communications materials are not inclusive.
Solution: Ensure marketing and communications, including photos and testimonials, reflect diverse people with a range of abilities and ages.

Barrier: People with disabilities are not included in visuals or considered as a potential target audience.
Solution: Ensure marketing materials, such as flyers, brochures, podcasts and YouTube videos are accessible. ●●●

New Kindergarten to Grade 8 School Coming to West St. Paul

A groundbreaking ceremony was held on March 10, 2026, to mark the beginning of construction on a new kindergarten to Grade 8 school in the Meadowlands development in the RM of West St. Paul.

Paul were among those in attendance at the ceremony to celebrate this milestone for the growing community.

The addition of École Meadowlands School will help support the continued growth

of West St. Paul and provide families with access to modern learning spaces close to home.

The school is expected to welcome students as early as September 2027.

A child-care facility will also be included as part of the project, providing space for up to 134 children, including infant, preschool, and school-age care.



École Meadowlands School is designed as an 82,000+ sq. ft. dual-track French immersion facility that will initially accommodate 675 students with the ability to support up to 800 students as enrolment grows. The facility will include modern classroom spaces, a gymnasium, a multipurpose room, and specialized learning areas such as human ecology and applied technology.

A child-care facility will also be included as part of the project, providing space for up to 134 children, including infant, preschool, and school-age care.

Yard Waste Collection Begins May 4th



Yard waste collection begins on the first Monday in May. Homes on the east side of Main Street will be the first to see collection on May 4th, followed by homes on the west side of Main Street the following week on May 11th. Collection in your zone will occur every second week and will continue through to October 31st.

Tips for successful collection

Yard waste must be at the curb by 7 a.m. for pick-up. It's important to separate yard waste from the regular waste stream. It's good for the environment, as yard waste is diverted from the landfill and turned into compost. Yard waste needs to be placed in either a brown paper bag, cardboard box or

a reusable container that's in good condition and does not have a lid so the contractor can see that it contains yard waste. The paper bags and cardboard boxes will be taken from your property and deposited directly in the compost at the landfill; reusable bins will be emptied and left behind for you to use again.

The RM and its contractor, Emterra, are not responsible for damage to reusable bins. Yard waste placed in plastic bags or noncompliant containers – like regular garbage and recycling carts – will not be collected. Bundles of branches can be placed beside the yard waste but must be tied (please use biodegradable string or twine), be less than 22 kg (50lbs) in weight, less than one metre (39 inches) in length and 10 cm (four inches) in diameter. ●●●



Introducing Bill C-263: A National Silver Alert Framework for Missing Seniors in Canada

When a vulnerable senior goes missing, every minute counts.

Two years ago, Mr. Earl Moberg, a beloved father, grandfather, and educator from North Kildonan who was living with dementia, went missing. Despite extensive search efforts by family, volunteers, and law enforcement, Earl was never found and is presumed deceased.

Following his disappearance, the Moberg family launched a petition calling for a national Silver Alert system, which I was honoured to sponsor in Parliament. Signed by more than 7,300 Canadians from every province and territory, the petition demonstrated strong national support for action to protect vulnerable seniors.

I would like to thank Brenda Moberg, Earl's wife, and Britt Moberg, his daughter, for their tireless advocacy in raising awareness and bringing national attention to the need for better tools to locate missing vulnerable Canadians.

The petition served as a launchpad for action to provide better tools to help find missing vulnerable Canadians. I am honoured to now bring forward legislation to establish a national Silver Alert framework in Canada.

In March, I introduced Bill C-263 in the House of Commons: the Silver Alert National Framework Act. The bill would establish a national framework to quickly alert the public when a vulnerable senior, such as someone living with dementia or another cognitive impairment, goes missing.

Bill C-263 would require the federal government to work with provinces, territories, and law enforcement to establish



coordinated national standards for issuing Silver Alerts. Using Canada's existing National Public Alerting System, alerts could be geo-targeted to nearby areas where a missing senior is most likely to be found, allowing authorities to quickly notify the public and enabling neighbours and communities to act as extra eyes and ears during the critical early hours after a senior goes missing.

When a person living with Alzheimer's goes missing, time is critical. If they are not found within 12 hours, there is about a 50 per cent chance they will be found injured or deceased.

A national Silver Alert framework is a matter of public safety, compassion, and common sense. I hope colleagues across party lines will join me in bringing this life-saving tool to communities across Canada.
